Five Minutes of Fame: Anne Gostelow

First of all I would like to acknowledge the kind political activists in the St Kilda community who, in the 1980's, recognised that a diverse range of St Kilda residents on low incomes were being pushed out of the area due to gentrification and rising rents. Their initial hard work and lobbying directly led to the establishment of quality Community Housing in the City of Port Phillip and then other suburbs. The same community housing that we live in with PPHA. As one of the longest PPHA tenants, I'd like to briefly tell the story of my PPHA property.

23 years ago I moved into a 3 bedroom flat, as a sole parent with two children, aged 1 and 9. What a relief it was to be offered secure, affordable housing after having to move house 4 times in the previous 3 years and worrying that due to rising rents we would have to move out of the area in which we had all our links.

Our block of 9 flats was the first property targeted for families that was managed by the then St Kilda Housing Association (SKHA, now PPHA). When I moved in all flats were tenanted. Three with SKHA tenants and the rest with private tenants, who had been living here before the block was sold and SKHA took over management. As the private tenants moved out flats were allocated to people on the SKHA waiting list. Over the years, there have been a few changes of residents in the 2 bedroom flats. The 3 bedroom flats have been stable, with long-term occupants. The present tenants generally respect each other's privacy and accept our differences as well as our commonalities. The long-term residents, who have supported each other through life's up and downs, naturally have a closer relationship.

Over the years some of the tenant's children have moved out and then come back home again. They are part of what

are termed the "Boomerang Generation". It can be very difficult to live out of home for this generation, particularly when their parents are unable to give them any financial help. I believe that the only thing I can do to help is to provide my young adult child with the home in which she has lived for most of her life, if needs be.

Generalities in the media about how the "boomerang generation" move back home to save money to buy their own property or travel and that their parents are losing their retirement savings as a result, does not take into consideration the children of low income, no asset parents in their analysis. My daughter now pays more rent than she did for the year she was living away from home. Also I am saving money because she pays half of the facility fees & usage for our amenities. Plus she helps around the house.

Being able to experience continuity of tenancy in a flat within our community has been great for my family and myself. I believe that all tenants of the Port Phillip Housing Association are extremely lucky to be living in secure, affordable and good quality social housing.

Holmesglen Neighborhood Activation Project


PPHA supported the successful City of Monash submission for a \$250,000 State Government grant to create an urban park in Ashwood, improving the aesthetic appeal, amenity and safety of the current shared bike/pedestrian path. The plan includes:

Upgrading a shared bike/pedestrian path to encourage more walking and cycling between the Holmesglen shopping strip and the local neighborhood

A new urban park with a rest and conversation area, multi-generational playspace, shade trees and garden. The multi-generation playspace will include a climbing wall, bike maintenance stations, bike racks and shaded spectator seating areas.

Artwork will be created on the climbing wall to help prevent graffiti and create a visual feature for the site.

Whilst the project won't be completed until 2017, PPHA will partner with Amaro Neighborhood House, to run mosaic workshops for residents to participate in the creation of the street art proposed for the site. Stay tuned for further news.

Home Is Where the Art Is

A large crowd were on hand for the opening of the latest exhibition of art works by the PPHA Tenant Artists Collective, this year as part of the Melbourne Fringe Festival.

Dean Stewart formally welcomed guests to country and Martin Foley MP, the Minister for Housing and Creative Arts, officially opened the exhibition. Ant Bridgeman and Jan Grey, who were both exhibitors, relayed some of their life experiences and gave an insider's view of the work involved in producing art for the exhibition.

The art was diverse in style, from writing to visual, from realistic to abstract, from ceramics to oils. It included the delicacy of cut and decorated egg shells to the intrigue of an electronic interactive titled "Inside My Brain". As the Fringe program

stated "Not restricted by theme, genre or medium, this show is a synthesis of creativity, storytelling and artistic expression.... The quality and diversity of the works in this exhibition will shatter the stigma and negative stereotypes generally associated with community housing."

A meet and greet with the artists and tour of the Gasworks Arts Park was held on 30 Sept. This provided an opportunity for the 50 tenants attending to learn some of the background to the pieces on display.

Celebrating the life of Richard James

(5/8/1931 – 23/9/2015)



At a celebration of the life of well-known St Kilda activist and PPHA tenant, Richard James, PPHA CEO, Karen Barnett, announced that

the next PPHA development in the City of Port Phillip would be named in honour of Richard.

"Richard was a tenant of PPHA for 15 years. He brought eloquence, charm, intelligence and an astute sense of politics and social justice to the people who needed it most – not just to his fellow tenants but to the broader community, to anyone without a voice. His caring

approach went wide. As a member of Port Phillip Council's Older Person's Consultative Group, he brought his outstanding personal qualities to the cause of older people. His sheer presence meant that what he had to say simply couldn't be ignored. Richard helped make a better local community and we want his work to live on through the name of the next community housing development," Karen said.

Richard had been involved in many local political campaigns, was a co-founder of Vintage Men, a member of the Port Phillip Council's Older Persons Consultative Group and the council's Gay and Lesbian Advisory Committee.

Richard had many guises – artist, volunteer, activist and performer. Ill-health prevented him from participating

in this year's 'Home is Where the Art Is' exhibition, but he enjoyed a bubbly at the opening the night before he died.

Richard's celebration of ageing as one of the joyous stages of life remains an inspiration.
